

## Pope Continues to Govern the Church, Says Vatican Secretary of State

**VATICAN CITY (CNS)** — Even on his worst days in Rome's Gemelli hospital, Pope Francis was governing the Catholic Church, although on some days, he did not seem to have the energy to sign his full name, said Cardinal Pietro Parolin.

The cardinal, who as Vatican secretary of state, coordinates much of the work of the Roman Curia, said it was true that the pope simply initialed some documents "F."

"He did," Cardinal Parolin told the Italian newspaper Corriere della Sera, "but now he is signing in full."

"It was not the ideal situation," he said in the interview published March

29. "But I emphasize that the pope is in a position to still govern the church, and we are happy that he was able to come home."

Pope Francis was in Rome's Gemelli hospital Feb. 14-March 23 for treatment of bronchitis, multiple infections and double pneumonia. His doctors said he had several breathing "crises" and was in danger of death.

The pope returned to his rooms in the Domus Sanctae Marthae with a recommendation from his doctors that he rest for two months, continue breathing exercises and physical therapy and continue taking medication for a persistent fungal infection.

"There is no change in the essentials" of how the Roman Curia works, Cardinal Parolin said. While the pope needs rest, documents are brought to him for "issues on which he and only he can and must decide."

"The governance of the church is in his hands," the cardinal said. "But there are many more routine matters on which his Curia collaborators can proceed even without consulting him, on the basis of previously received indications and existing regula-

All the Vatican dicasteries work in the pope's name, he said. "Obviously, the more important decisions must be made by the pontiff, but there are also others that can be taken within each dicastery following the guidelines the pope has given them."

Pope Francis also can delegate certain tasks, Cardinal Parolin said, and Catholics may see that during the pope's convales-

For example, he said, "in the case of canonizations, it is the pope who pronounces the formula, but even this, if necessary, can be delegated to a collaborator, who pronounces it in the name of the pontiff."

The issue is particularly relevant given the scheduled canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis April 27 during the Jubilee of Teenagers. Blessed Acutis, an Italian computer whiz, died of leukemia in 2006 at the age of 15.

Pope Francis can delegate a cardinal to preside over the canonization rite and read the formula to "declare and define" Blessed Acutis a saint and to order that he be venerated as such by the universal church.


As of late March, the pope had not delegated anyone to take his place though, the cardinal said. "It will depend on how the Holy Father is feeling then."

During the pilgrimage, the faithful will have the opportunity to visit six churches in the Wheeling area to pray before the Blessed Sacrament. A special booklet has been created which allows the pilgrims to follow along the narrative of Jesus' time in the Garden of Gethsemane as well as provide opportunities for personal prayer and meditation.





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

# St. John Paul II Tirelessly Served Church, Embraced World, Cardinal Says

**VATICAN CITY (CNS)** — During his long and fruitful pontificate, St. John Paul II embraced the entire world, which stands yet again in need of his blessing, Cardinal Pietro Parolin said.

"Bless us, Holy Father John Paul II. Bless the Lord's church on its journey, that it may be a pilgrim of hope. Bless this lacerated and disoriented humanity, that it may find the way back to its dignity and its highest vocation, that it may know the riches of God's mercy and love," the cardinal said during a memorial Mass in St. Peter's Basilica April 2, the 20th anniversary of the late Polish pope's death.

Hundreds of faithful attended the Mass, including Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni, a small government delegation representing Poland as well as cardinals and bishops living in Rome and diplomats accredited to the Vatican.

Retired Polish Cardinal Stanislaw Dziwisz, who served as St. John Paul's personal secretary from 1966 until the pope's death in 2005, greeted and thanked all those who were present.

"Our hearts go out to the Holy Father Francis," who could not attend as he continues to recover in his residence, the Polish cardinal said. "We know that right now, he is spiritually united with us."

"We pray for his health, that the Lord will give him the strength he needs to lead the pilgrim church in this Jubilee Year, under the banner of hope in these difficult times for the church and also for the world," the cardinal said.

Pope Francis had sent Cardinal Dziwisz a letter before his hospitalization Feb. 14, expressing his wishes for a peaceful Holy Year

lived in a spirit of hope and offering his blessings to all those taking part in events April 2.

audience at the Vatican in 2001.

Cardinal Parolin, who began serving in the Vatican Secretariat of State under the late pope starting in 1986, gave the homily, which recalled the legacy and spirituality of the Polish pope, whose pontificate of more than 26 years was the third longest in history.

Pope John Paul exclaimed "with impressive force from the very first unforgettable homily at the inauguration of his pontificate, 'Do not be afraid. Open wide the doors for Christ,'" who knows what humanity is meant to be and points the way to eternal life, the cardinal said

Because of that conviction, the late pope "could address with authority and firmness not only the Catholic faithful, but also peoples and government leaders," urging them to "be aware of their responsibility to defend justice, the dignity of human persons and peace," he said.

"We remember with gratitude and admiration his tireless service of peace, his passionate warnings, his diplomatic initiatives trying to avert wars" even when he was experiencing difficult moments in his life and "the fragility of physical strength was already evident," Cardinal Parolin said.

St. John Paul never gave up, he said, even while "many of his appeals remained unfortunately unheeded, as happens even to great prophets."

Another unforgettable hallmark of Pope John Paul's legacy, he said, was the great Holy Year of 2000 and his ushering the church and the world into the third millennium.

The pope invited the church to confidently set out to sea and cast wide its nets with the new evangelization, he said.

"His words continue to inspire us and are echoed today by his successor, Francis, in this new jubilee," which also sees the church's faithful as setting out into "troubled waters, but still pilgrims of hope," he said, "guided by Peter's successor and assisted by the Holy Spirit."

Like the "countless pilgrims who continually come to this basilica and ask for his intercession at the altar where his body rests," Cardinal Parolin prayed the saint would continue to bless all the faithful, the church and humanity so that everyone would know God's mercy and love.

After the Mass, dignitaries processed to St. John Paul's tomb to pray. Cardinal Dzivisz placed a lit white candle on the altar and four representatives of Poland set a large bouquet of red and white roses, the colors of the Polish flag, next to the tomb, which was adorned with many flowers.

Cardinal Baldassare Reina, the papal vicar of Rome, read a prayer, asking for the saint to bless the world's young people and the faithful so they would be "tireless missionaries of the Gospel today."

"Bless every family," he said, underlining how the pope warned against "Satan's assault against this precious spark of heaven that God has lit on earth. Make us strong and courageous in defending the family."

"Pray for the whole world, scarred by so many injustices and lacerated by absurd wars, which turn the world into a bloody battlefield, deliver us from war, which is always a defeat for everyone," Cardinal Reina said.

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
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# Evening of Music at Mount St. Joseph Celebrates Black Heritage

D.C. area.


The song asks a question, "Who will speak if you don't", referring to who will speak on behalf of those who are marginalized in the world.

# Myanmar Death Toll Surpasses 2,000; Cardinal Calls for Immediate Ceasefire Amid Tragedy

(OSV News) — People in Myanmar are in desperate need of humanitarian supplies and medical support as the death toll from the devastating earthquake that rocked central Myanmar March 28 continues to rise.

The president of Myanmar's bishops' conference called for an immediate ceasefire in a country already experiencing civil war and now hit with a new tragedy.

As the number of deaths exceeded 2,000, according to Reuters news agency, some 3,900 were injured. However, hundreds more are still missing or feared dead in the wake of the massive quake.

In an X post published March 30, the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, or OCHA, in Myanmar said that the disaster has placed "more pressure on already vulnerable people facing an alarming humanitarian crisis."

"People urgently need shelter, medical care, and water and sanitation support," OCHA Myanmar said.

The epicenter of the 7.7 magnitude earthquake struck near Mandalay, the country's second largest city, destroying roads, buildings and religious sites.

The U Hla Thein Buddhist monastery in Mandalay was destroyed during the quake while an estimated 270 monks were taking an exam. According to The Associated Press, some 70 monks were able to escape. However, 50 were found dead and over a hundred more are still buried underneath the rubble.

Members of the city's Muslim community also suffered as the earthquake struck while hundreds were gathered in prayers at local mosques during the month of Ramadan. An estimated 700 Muslim worshippers were killed while dozens of mosques in the country were damaged or destroyed, AP reported.

Prayers and calls for immediate ceasefire increase.

Pope Francis, who continues to recover at the Vatican, called for prayers for Myanmar. In his Sunday Angelus address published March 30, the pope prayed for peace in several countries as well as for "Myanmar, which is also suffering so much because of the earthquake."

Burmese Cardinal Charles Muang Bo of Yangon, president of the Catholic bishops' conference of Myanmar, issued a statement acknowledging the pope's prayers and expressing condolences "for those who perished in places of worship in pagodas and mosques."

Assuring that the Catholic Church would

"mobilize support to assist with the life-saving needs of food, medicine, and shelter," Cardinal Bo said a ceasefire in the country's ongoing civil war was "imperative" to provide humanitarian relief "for those affected by both the earthquake and the prolonged conflict."

"This humanitarian crisis calls for an urgent cessation of hostilities. We urgently call for an immediate and comprehensive ceasefire by all parties involved in the conflict to ensure the safe and unimpeded delivery of essential humanitarian aid by local and international supporters," Cardinal Bo wrote.

Prior to the earthquake, Myanmar was in the throes of a civil war being fought between the military junta after overthrowing the democratically elected government in 2021. Since then, the governing military junta has been accused of violence against civilians opposed to its rule and has been engaged in multiple conflicts with armed groups in the country.

While resistance movements in the country have unilaterally called for a two-week ceasefire in areas affected by the earthquake, the U.N.'s special rapporteur on the situation of human rights in Myanmar, Tom Andrews, expressed outrage following reports that the governing military junta continued bombing rebel-held areas after the quake.

In an interview with the BBC, Andrews said the bombings were "completely outrageous and unacceptable," adding that it was "nothing short of incredible" that the military continued to "drop bombs when you are trying to rescue people."

"Anyone who has influence on the military needs to step up the pressure and make it very clear that this is not acceptable," Andrews said. "I'm calling upon the junta to just stop, stop any of its military operations."



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



# Wheeling University Nursing Program Receives \$750,000 from West Virginia's Nursing Workforce Expansion Program

WHEELING—Wheeling University has been awarded \$750,000 through West Virginia's Nursing Workforce Expansion Program, which is designed to address the state's nursing shortage through a multifaceted approach to attract, train and retain nurses in the Mountain State.

President Dianna M. Vargo, Ed.D. said, "Wheeling University is grateful to the State of West Virginia and the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission for providing this essential funding that will enhance our nursing program."

According to the Nursing Workforce Expansion Program, it established this award program three years ago to fund nursing program expansion projects at colleges, universities, schools of nursing and career technical education centers across West Virginia.

Through this grant Wheeling University's Nursing program will use the funding to expand its enrollment, increase simulation experiences for nursing students, update the curriculum, recruit and retain nursing faculty and increase NCLEX pass rates.

Director of Nursing Programs Jill Emery said, "This funding empowers Wheeling University to help build a sustainable, well-educated workforce, which is crucial for meeting the community's growing healthcare demands. We wish to thank the HEPC for this funding which will impact health care in communities across the state."

Twenty-three grant awards were distributed to nursing programs statewide for the third year of the program. Funded projects build upon progress made in the first two years and are focused on increasing enrollment in pre-licensure nursing programs, timely degree completion and licensure for graduates.

Since its launch, West Virginia's Nursing Workforce Expansion Program has helped yield a nearly 25 percent increase in filled seats




